

Carl Ditters von Dittersdorf Workshop Multimedia Lesson

This lesson plan offers suggestions for the development of four different lessons that can be taught separately or in combination with each other. Teachers may develop these lessons in the spaces provided at the Additional Teacher Planning spaces. These lessons can be taught as whole group lessons or for specific differentiated learning applications. It is always important to provide for flexibility in teaching due to both positive and negative factors that may take place in the classroom.

Aims

Aim 1: To have students learn about various elements of music through music of Karl Ditters von Dittersdorf by using a multisensory approach.

Aim 2: To have students learn about the use of healthy, relaxed, piano technique through music of Karl Ditters von Dittersdorf.

Aim 3: To have students practice singing low to high notes and high to low notes while listening to the Hocus Pocus Overture of Karl Ditters von Dittersdorf.

Aim 4: To have students understand geographical and historical factors during the lifetime of Karl Ditters von Dittersdorf.

Additional Teacher Planning

Some Suggested Activities:

Keeping time with percussion

Clapping out rhythms'

Showing note directionality with hand gestures

Conducting

Playing simple accompaniments

Recognizing rhythm patterns by using large note notation

Singing the low to high note song

Using roll up keyboards, midi keyboards, acoustic pianos, and/or xylophones, have students play accompaniments to the dances. Label the keys with masking tape using letter names as needed. Have the students play repeated notes and call out the note names. Make it into a fun game.
